

This is a review of the iPad Kindle Edition only, which is definitely not ready for prime time. There is no tapable table of contents and only the built-in navigational aids which are not up to the task. The only solution is to create your own bookmarks which takes forever, but is mandatory if you want to navigate to chapters and plant lists. Nothing within the book has hyperlinks. Also, for some reason, the Kindle book has scanned images of the actual pages with relatively poor resolution followed by the text of the page in a very readable but not always properly formatted version; this concept continues throughout the book. The content of the book is excellent, but only accessible in the print edition.
