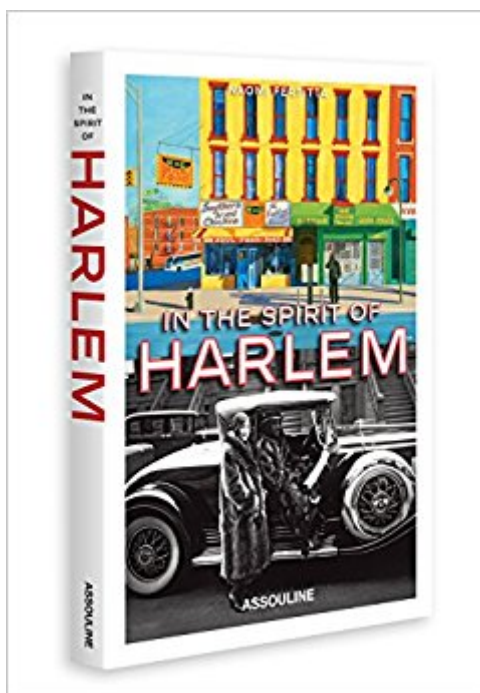


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In The Spirit Of Harlem (Icons)

This book has a terrific selection of photos, most of which are from long ago. Also, the front cover is particularly beautiful - and the front & back inside covers have beautiful graphic art (it's the same on

both sides).

I asked for the books to be wrapped and I am VERY disappointed with the results. I need to take off the paper and redo - its embarrassing.

This is the third book from the publishing company Assouline (now celebrating 20 years of printing Art books) that I've reviewed and this is another fine example of mixing great graphics on high quality paper with informative text. While a full-page photo of restaurateur Marcus Samuelson (who wrote the one-page Foreword) seemed a bit out of place to me, the rest of this 144-page 8x10 inch is filled with great images of both past and present Harlem. The majority are of Harlem's past and this is what I loved about it though there are some recent color photos to show what the old neighborhoods look like now. Two subjects are prominent here: Entertainment and Civil Rights. Harlem was the center for both. The author has acquired photos from the Getty Images and other graphic archives and shows us images of theaters like the Apollo and night clubs like the Cotton Club. There are full page black and white images of the legends of jazz like Fats Waller, Bessie Smith and Charlie Parker (though I found the purposely double exposed image of Parker to be a poor choice. (The two-page black and white photo of Lindy hops on pages 104-105 has red blotches on it, but the publisher told me that they were planned that way.). Because of these two images I felt I need to deduct a star from my rating. The rest of the images are sharp and clear and in the case of the color photos and images of sheet music colorful. The author provides just enough text to explain the cultural history of the neighborhood. To someone who hasn't been there. She also provides a listing of museums, music venues, one hotel, and list of selected shops and restaurants and bars. Assouline is primarily an Art publisher and, while smaller in size than many of their other volumes, this can serve as a coffee-table book too. I've returned to it twice to look at the photos while listening to one of my favorite Louis Armstrong albums. It put me in the mood. I hope you found this review both informative and helpful.
